


Sam's Point Preserve in a series of transactions that culminated in 1997. According to OSI's president, Joe Martens, the two highest summits in the entire 245-mile **Shawangunk Range** are located at the Sam's Point Preserve.

The preserve is managed by The Nature Conservancy. In addition to developing the *Conservation Center*, The Conservancy provides public hikes, manages hunting on the *Preserve* and works with a corps of more than 60 local volunteers on trail maintenance and other aspects of stewardship. "Our conservation partnership has resulted in Sam's Point being managed both for recreation and protection, and the *Conservation Center* will provide a wonderful opportunity for people to gain better appreciation for the Shawangunks," said Martens. The **Northern Shawangunks** are widely-recognized as one of the most important sites for biodiversity conservation in the northeastern United States. The **Ridge** supports more than 35 natural communities, with five that are globally-rare. *Sam's Point Preserve* is home to the world's

best example of a dwarf pine ridge community, where more than 30 rare plant and animal species can be found, leading The Nature Conservancy to designate the **Ridge** as one of Earth's "Last Great Places" for landscape-level biodiversity conservation.

"This new center will help people who visit the **Shawangunks** better understand this distinctive and fragile ecosystem and the importance of protecting it," said Carol Ash, Executive Director of the Palisades Interstate Park Commission, and manager of the neighboring *Minnewaska State Park Preserve*.

Funds for the project are from public and private sources, with a substantial grant from the Clean Water/Clean Air Bond Act.
