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Life Skills Lessons for HS Class

Students in High School teacher Karin Hopkins' class (at right, in picture, bottom left, with her class, and Efrain Vergona) had a special opportunity when they visited Pilot Industries in Ellenville on May 3rd. As a follow-up to lessons on work habits and skills needed for a job, she contacted Laurie Gallagher, School to Work Coordinator of Ulster County ARC, to arrange for the visit to explore possible job opportunities.

Efrain Vergona, Kingston Vocational Coordinator, spoke to the students, giving them an overview of the program.

During the tour of the workshop, provided by Production Coordinator Jane Taylor, students were informed that Ellenville is a training area, a "stepping stone" for job placement in the community. An emphasis is on communication skills, taking directions, and being punctual.

At the Ellenville site, there are 40 consumers, working in one of three work areas. These jobs are part of a subcontract program with major companies, such as a special 3-year contract with New York State for their Drug Force Kits.

Consumers in the workshop are trained on all machinery, some of which is adapted for either hand or foot control. It's a team effort, with consumers receiving their pay based on a piece production basis. A great emphasis is placed on safety issues. Machines are unplugged until they are used. Consumers have two 15-minute breaks and a 30minute lunch break. A monthly recognition award is given with the winner receiving a special lunch.

Crystal Dawn, Service Coordinator, informed the group that her job is to get to know each client, figure out needs (e.g., interviewing skills), help with housing and transportation, conduct evaluations, and work with the vocational coordinator. The goal is to get consumers an evaluation and a placement in an employment situation. Opportunities for summer School to Work programs exist for the students.



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
