Artist Linda Thomas (photo, top right) prepared the huge Habitat mural on large wallpaper-like sections in her home studio, after much research on the native flora and fauna. Many of the animals and plants are woven into the picture's landscape, and a numbered chart is at the base (and on printed handouts) so one can locate dozens of species, many unique to the Ridge. A life-size sculpture of a turkey vulture by Roger Baker hovers in front of the left half of the mural (second photo, right), which is simply too large to be taken in from one location only. There are also hologram-like 3-D displays that show the cycles of



life following a fire on the mountain (above, left), and how the ice caves were geologically formed (below, left).
